Jonah 4:1-11

That's why I fled toward Tarshish in the first place. Similarities with Jonah:

- Relapse → (God's patience)
- Emotional roller coaster
- Temptation to quit
- Conflict: comfort & cause
- Cliff-hanger (unresolved ending)

Jonah 4:1-2

Jonah was greatly displeased and became furious. ² He prayed to the Lord, "Please, Lord, isn't this what I said while I was still in my own country? That's why I fled toward Tarshish in the first place. I knew that You are a gracious and compassionate God, slow to anger, abounding in faithful love, and one who relents from sending disaster.

Jonah is upset because God acted like Himself.

His problem is resistance and resentment.

1) How **excited** are we that God is on the **throne** and not us?

When things do not go Jonah's (~our) way -

- Runs
- Gets angry
- Wants to give up

Anger is "soul" gauge \rightarrow Evidence that self is on the throne ...?

- Nationalism: Nineveh destroyed
- Self-righteousness: Jonah's sin is < Nineveh's
- Ego: He knows better than God

The last enemy to be destroyed in the believer is SELF.

Jonah 4:3-6a

And now, Lord, take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live."

- Plant; worm; scorching wind
- 2) Are we aware of how our enemies cooperate and can potentially blind us to God's purposes as well as to His grace & mercy?

Martin Luther--

"The devil rode upon my back."

- Satan did not send the plant, the worm or the wind!
- Satan attacks through the sinful (~enthroned) self.
 - o Indwelling sin: dormant (Ch. 2-3) into a landing zone (Ch.1,4)

Jonah 4:9-11

3) Have we embraced the reality that God is thoroughly committed to our transformation?

- Jonah AND Nineveh
- OVER circumstantial comfort & personal preference
- OVER our performance

God's love is a transforming love, not merely an accepting love.

- Accepting love at some point becomes unloving
- Unholy happiness does not last

4 Steps toward Transformation & Purpose:

Be born again into God's family (or be sure you are born again)

I John 3:9

The person who has been born into God's family does not make a practice of sinning because now God's life is in him; so he can't keep on sinning, for this new life has been born into him and controls him—he has been born again.

4 Steps toward Transformation & Purpose:

- Be born again into God's family ...
- Commit to prayer
- Embrace & trust the God appointed process
- Answer the call and advance the Kingdom of God!

4) What becomes of **Jonah** ...? What's the **next chapter** in our story?

- A people of grace who practice the presence of God
- A people who are generous for the Kingdom of God
- A people who willingly go to Nineveh
