INVITATION

We invite you to pause, listen, and shift your gaze toward the Father ...

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Growing up in Los Angeles, my family had a tradition of taking long, beautiful drives up and down the coast. And back in the day, when we didn't have tablets or TVs in the car, I would spend most of my time talking to God as I stared at the vastness of creation outside the window. In the moments when the sun would shine through the clouds and onto my face, I would imagine God holding me and letting me know how much He loved me. I knew, even at that young age, that the living God of the universe was with me.

Read Luke 24:1–12. What do you notice that you've never noticed before? If you had been with the women at the tomb, what would have surprised you most about that morning?

The greatest difference between many other religions and Christianity is Jesus Christ—the *living* God—crucified, resurrected, ascended into heaven, and returning to earth one day. Without Jesus, and without His resurrection, there is no hope—we would be worshipping a mere, good human. But because God rose Jesus from the dead and He is alive, we can walk with heads and hands held high—we worship a living God! And through the Holy Spirit, that living God lives in us.

Jesus—the *living* God—is with you and in you. What questions do you have for Him today? What words of praise and thanksgiving are on your heart? Tell Him!

DID YOU KNOW?

FOUNDATION BUILDING BLOCKS

WHO?

God's big story reaches its high point when God raises Jesus from the dead—He is risen! Jesus' resurrection is discovered and proclaimed by women, a great honor in a culture that often undervalued women. They proclaim the truth with joy!

WHAT?

Jesus told His disciples He would die and rise again. They wanted Him to be a conquering king who would defeat Rome and restore Israel to power. But Jesus' victory was bigger and better—it brought salvation to the world!

WHERE?

Jesus was buried by Joseph of Arimathea in a tomb near the site of the resurrection. Joseph was accompanied by Nicodemus, the same man who had come to Jesus to hear about how God so loved the world that He sent His one and only Son.

WHEN?

Jesus is risen on a Sunday morning, the third day after He died. This would have fallen on the Festival of First Fruits (Leviticus 23:9–13). Jesus is the "first fruits" of those who will be resurrected, a further reminder of the hope we have!

CONNECTING TO GOD'S BIG STORY:

Jesus fulfilled God's promises by dying for our sins. God raised Jesus from the dead, proving that His sacrifice was sufficient and that He is God. Jesus is now exalted to the highest place, and in time, all will acknowledge that He is Lord (Philippians 2:9–11)!



LESSON 4 **EARLY CHILDHOOD**

Spark curiosity and get kids thinking about the wonder of God.

LESSON AT A GLANCE

WONDER TRUTH: Jesus Is Alive!
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Play Stations

SUPPLIES: bin, dry beans, small paper (or plastic) hearts, plastic Easter eggs, toy musical instruments, coloring utensils, pots and pans (optional), wooden spoons (optional), plastic Easter eggs with dry beans inside (optional)

RESOURCES: [The Resurrection Coloring Sheet \(1 per kid\)](#)

Greet the kids warmly and briefly explain the play stations to them. Invite them to play at any of the stations.

Welcome to church! While we're getting ready to start, you can play at any of these stations to help you get ready for our lesson today. Do you have any ideas about what we'll be learning today?

Play Station: Easter Egg Sensory Bin

Set up: Fill a bin with dry beans and mix in some paper (or plastic) hearts. Set out empty plastic Easter eggs.

Play: Let the kids fill the plastic eggs with beans, shake them, and then empty them. See if they can hide a heart inside one of the eggs. Ask what they hear when they shake a filled egg and an empty egg.

Play Station: Music Praise

Set up: Set out toy musical instruments (or make your own using pots and pans and wooden spoons or plastic Easter eggs filled with dry beans).

Play: Let the kids play with the instruments and make their own music as a way to celebrate Jesus and praise God for Jesus.

Play Station: The Resurrection Coloring Sheet

Set up: Ahead of time, print one copy per kid of the coloring sheet and set out coloring utensils.

Play: Let the kids color. The kids could also turn the sheet over and draw a picture of a cross or anything that reminds them of Easter and Jesus.

Word of Wonder

SUPPLIES: Bible

WORD OF WONDER

Jesus makes us new.

—from 2 Corinthians 5:17

Ahead of time, print the Word of Wonder Sheets. **Our Word of Wonder for the Created New series is from 2 Corinthians 5:17. Let's practice saying the Word of Wonder together.**

Our Word of Wonder is from 2 Corinthians 5:17. We've learned Jesus died on the cross so our sins—all the wrong things we think, say and do—can be forgiven. When we're forgiven, we get a new way to live. Jesus makes us new! He makes us new because He loves us.

Hold up the Word of Wonder Sheets. **Look at the picture on the first page: It has a person on it. That's like us. What are we like before**

we follow Jesus? Allow the kids to respond. **Without Jesus, we live for ourselves. We sin and we are far from God. We aren't whole. We were made to be in relationship with God. But when we trust in Jesus, He makes us new. The next page shows a person surrounded by hearts.**

What do you think the hearts are for? Allow the kids to respond. **Jesus loves us! He forgives us and makes our hearts new. Let's say the Word of Wonder together again a few more times. Each time we say, "new," I'll choose someone to hold up the second page with the person surrounded by hearts.** Say the verse several times together and choose a person to hold up the second page when you say "new."

Encourage the kids to do the motions and say the verse with you.

- **JESUS**—Point fingers from left hand into right palm, then right hand into left palm (sign language for "Jesus").
- **MAKES US**—Both hands over your heart.
- **NEW.**—Bring both arms out in front of you and down to your sides.
- **FROM 2 CORINTHIANS 5:17**—Hold your hands together as if opening a book.

Gather kids to discuss these questions:

- **What does Jesus do in us?** (Jesus makes us new.)
- **How does it feel to know Jesus died for you because He loves you so much?**

God's Big Story

SUPPLIES: Bible; Bible Story Picture (optional)

Bible Time Rhyme

Say the Bible time rhyme (with motions) each week before the Bible story to remind kids that what they're about to hear is part of God's big story.

I open my Bible, and what do I see? (Hold your hands together, then open your palms, as if opening a book.)

God's big story, waiting for me! (Point to yourself.)

Let's hear part of God's big story, which comes from the book of Luke in the Bible, which is in the New Testament.

Hold up a Bible and show the kids. Open a Bible and show them where the story is found in the book of Luke.

Circle Time: Questions in Eggs

SUPPLIES: scissors (prep only), plastic eggs (7), permanent marker, basket

RESOURCES: [Questions Sheet \(1/SG\)](#)

Ahead of time, print the Questions Sheet and cut the questions apart. Place one question inside each plastic egg. Use a permanent marker to number the eggs 1–7, corresponding to the number of each question.

Put the eggs in a basket and gather the kids to sit in a circle. **In our story, we learned that Jesus died, but He didn't stay dead. He came back to life. And He's alive now! He died for us because He loves us. We're going to answer some questions using the eggs.** Choose one kid to select any egg and open it, then hand you the paper so you can read the question. Give the kids an opportunity to answer the question. Choose a different kid to select each egg from the basket.

1. Where did Jesus die?
2. Where was Jesus' body put after He died?
3. How many days was Jesus' body in the tomb?
4. What happened to Jesus after the three days?
5. Who found the tomb empty first?
6. How do you think Jesus' friends felt when they found out Jesus was alive?
7. How do you feel knowing Jesus is alive now?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. **Where did Jesus die?** (on a cross)
2. **Where was Jesus' body put after He died?** (a tomb)
3. **How many days was Jesus' body in the tomb?** (three days)
4. **What happened to Jesus after the three days?** (He came back to life.)
5. **Who found the tomb empty first?** (the women)
6. **How do you think Jesus' friends felt when they found out Jesus was alive?**
7. **How do you feel knowing Jesus is alive now?**

We used eggs to find our questions. The questions were inside the eggs, but nothing was inside the tomb where Jesus' friends put His body. He is alive! Jesus is so powerful that He even has power over death. Let's talk to God now in prayer!

Leader Tip: Jesus' death on the cross may be a new concept to some kids and may be familiar to others. Be prepared to engage with those children who have deeper questions about the death and resurrection.

Invite kids to share prayer requests and praises and to pray for each other. Some kids may not be comfortable praying out loud. That's OK! Encourage them to pray silently and thank God for Jesus and His life. God hears all our prayers!

Head to Large Group!

Return and finish the rest of this guide before parents arrive.

Craft: Creating Crosses

SUPPLIES: various colors of construction paper (at least 1 sheet per kid), craft sticks (at least 2 per kid), glue, coloring utensils (optional), Easter-themed stickers (optional)

Jesus didn't stay dead! He came back to life, and we can celebrate! It was sad when Jesus died on the cross. But we can be thankful for the cross because Jesus died to forgive our sins, and He came back to life! We can say, "Thank You" to God for this wonderful gift! We can celebrate Jesus and His resurrection! The word resurrection means He has come back to life. Let's make our own crosses to take home as a reminder of the wonderful gift Jesus gave us: forgiveness and His life!

Give each child a sheet of colored construction paper and two craft sticks. Help them glue the craft sticks onto the paper in the shape of a cross. You can also invite the kids to decorate the paper with coloring utensils and Easter-themed stickers. Make an extra cross to show the kids as an example and also to use in the Closing Game.



Game: Jesus Is Alive Circle Chase

How do you think the women at the tomb and Peter felt when they saw the empty tomb? Allow the kids to respond. **Do you think they were surprised? They saw that Jesus was not dead anymore. He came back to life. Now He lives forever and ever. We can thank God for Jesus!**

Have the kids form a circle and sit down. This game is similar to “Duck, Duck, Goose” except kids will say, “Jesus is alive!” Designate one kid to tap heads as she goes around the circle. Have that kid begin making her way around the circle with this phrase: “Jesus is ... Jesus is alive!” When a kid gets tapped on the word “alive,” he will get up to chase the tapper around the circle one time before it’s his turn to tap others.

Leader Tip: You can keep this game easy and cooperative by avoiding any tagging as part of the chase. It may help not to have a spot in the middle of the circle, as kids this age may become confused or upset by playing the game in a more competitive way.

Make It Inclusive: For kids who aren’t able to run (or choose not to run) or don’t want to have their heads tapped, adapt the game and have them sit in their own area and stand up (or raise their arms up) when they hear the phrase “Jesus is alive!”
